So it won't have escaped your attention, I'm sure, that it's been a difficult week in Westminster. The Prime Minister's resignation on Thursday had become somewhat inevitable, as it became clear that the mistakes made around the handling of the mini-budget in particular meant that she no longer had the confidence of enough peope to be able to deliver her plans. In fairness to her - though she made some major errors in her short time in office - her principles are the right ones, and I feel for her on what must have been an incredibly difficult day yesterday.

There's been a lot of disappointment in recent months hasn't there, as first the huge opportunity that was presented by Boris being so engaging and so different went to waste, and now the opportunity to take forward a genuinely conservative, low tax, pro-growth agenda that I firmly believe is the right way to do things has been lost through mismanagement. It's been a tough few months for our country... but now we have a chance to reset. It's a chance we need to take.

I haven't yet decided how I will use my vote on Monday, in the contest to choose a new Prime Minister. Now that we know the rules, a maximum of three names will be able to come forward on Monday afternoon for MPs to consider. The early front runners are Rishi, Penny and Boris. ## Another busy week in Parliament, plenty of positive news as a distraction from current events!

Plenty to report back on this week as I began my work on the Levelling-up and Regeneration Bill Committee in which I'm ensuring Nottinghamshire is front and centre of all things 'levelling-up'.

I've made some important contributions in Parliament around education and ensuring that schools train and retain local teachers within the community, and offered my views on the role apprenticeships have to play in this, both in reducing the cost and the time out of the classroom for future teachers.

I also spoke about how 30% of schools in the East Midlands do not have a single male teacher and how this needs to improve so that young men have positive role models to influence them as they grow up.

In the constituency, work has begun on the £76m investment by Severn Trent to make Mansfield safer from the risk of flooding, creating "rain gardens" that double up as flood alleviation. More on all this below!

This week I began my work on the Levelling-up and Regeneration Public Bill Committee




I've spent a chunk of time this week on the Levelling-up and Regeneration Bill Committee! A Public Bill Committee is a committee set up by the House of Commons to examine the details of a particular Bill, and literally go through the clauses line by line.

The Levelling-up and Regeneration Bill is something I'm incredibly passionate about - it'll bring SO many opportunities to our area! We're already seeing the benefits of the levelling-up agenda through our world-beating STEP nuclear reactor programme based here in Nottinghamshire, investments in the pipeline through Towns Fund and Levelling Up Fund bids worth over £150m across North Notts, and more. Though much of this work in still in planning stages, the money is committed and things will start to take shape in the coming months.

I'm keen to get as involved as possible, particularly as this Bill is what will confirm our £1.1 BILLION new investment through our devolution deal, to hand more powers over local investment, jobs and transport down to our local area instead of things being decided in Whitehall.

Lots of work to be done and I'll be ensuring Mansfield and the rest of the region are at the heart of Government's plans.

#### HUGE progress improving local highways



In Wednesday's debate in Parliament on transport in Nottinghamshire - brought forward by Gedling's Tom Randall MP - I gave an update on our huge progress in improving local highways.

Areas like the A60 at Berry Hill and A617 at Rainworth are examples of the new, high quality repairs we're rolling out, and so far we've reduced the use of temporary repairs by nearly 60%, with the scale of new high quality repairs having DOUBLED.

It's a massive long term project, but that's real progress.

As I said in my speech, its key to our long term plans to grow our economy and create opportunities, as well as being a big priority for residents. Nottinghamshire County Council are making major improvements and investing and extra £12m.

How we can support people from a range of backgrounds into teaching careers




#### MORE OPTIONS FOR TEACHERS TO PROGRESS

I also spoke in Westminster Hall about ways to support people with a wider range of backgrounds and experience into teaching, including supporting highly qualified early years practitioners in to primary education, offering more routes for people to shift from business or other sectors in to schools, and 'learn on the job' apprenticeship-type opportunities for teaching assistants and others.

I also asked the Minister to look at ways to get more men in to teaching, as 30% of East Midlands schools don't have a single male teacher, which I think is really bad news for many young people who need positive male role models more than ever.

I raised concerns about the implications this part of the bill presents for free speech and the power this would give to social media companies to decide what constitutes harmful content.

Did you know that Rolls Royce has approximately 64% of their workforce based in the East Midlands!


