PM's decision on petrol and diesel cars is fantastic news for worried residents

On Thursday at our full council meeting I was asked about the impact of the Prime Minister's decision to ditch bans on petrol and diesel vehicles.

Short answer, I think it's fantastic news for residents who have been worried about the cost and practicalities of having to fund electric vehicles or the risk of price increases for second hand cars, as well as being really positive for local jobs and investment, with local car manufacturer Toyota backing the plans and giving security to 2500 employees.

Businesses like that, and others across our area, are at the forefront of clean energy innovation; hydrogen, fusion, modular nuclear, and more. The PM recommitted to the 'green growth' stuff, the innovation, research and investment, and thankfully shifted away from previous proposals to ban stuff or force people to buy expensive kit. That's good news for local jobs and the East Midlands economy.

Rejecting calls to roll out Sadiq Khan's flagship policies in Notts

At the Full Council meeting of Nottinghamshire County Council, the Ashfield Independents are asking us to consider rolling out the same policies as lauded recently by London Mayor Sadiq Khan. Khan has recently spent £130m of taxpayers money in extending Free School Meals to every child, but of course 'Free' School Meals are not free, they're funded by taxpayers, who are now shelling out to feed the children of Lawyers, Politicians, Consultants and Professional Footballers...

I fully accept and understand the vital importance of supporting people who need help to get by. Throughout my time as Council Leader I've shifted the whole agenda towards 'prevention' and supporting those families and communities who most need help as a top priority. We're working hard to ensure that taxpayer's money is targeted where it's most needed. What I will NEVER do, is shift it back the other way, and put millions and millions of pounds in to offering free meals to people who neither need nor want them. It's mad, and a total waste.

Meanwhile, schools and Councils in London are set to be hammered by the additional, unfunded costs of the scheme. Lewisham Council have explained that schools in the area will be hit by some £600k of extra costs to try and cater for every child, every day, where previously many children would have brought their own lunch. Many schools don't have the staff or the kitchen space and equipment to physically manage delivering this. None of this is factored in, and both schools and local authorities - also taxpayer funded of course - are having to pick up the pieces at the expense of their existing services.

Not only has Sadiq spent £130m on this - a one off budget just for election year, of course - not just helping those who are struggling but fundamentally making the state responsible for feeding every child, even the children of the rich, he's done that by extending the taxes and charges paid by normal working people, including those who might already be struggling themselves.

Sadiq's 'Free' School Meals are funded by the hated ULEZ scheme, where he charges people £12.50 a day just to go to work or go about their daily lives. Meanwhile, the richest can afford ULEZ compliant vehicles and so don't pay. He's using that money - the £12.50 a day extra tax on working families - to fund free meals for people who are currently quite happily paying for it themselves.

For example, a single parent who is supporting two kids working as an electrician, who might be struggling with the bills already and kids might already be in receipt of Free School Meals, is now paying an extra £12.50 a day in ULEZ charges so that a player at Fulham FC on £30k a week can also get free meals at school for their kids. Utter, utter, madness. He's not seeking to find ways to help those in need. He's not considering whether to extend support to more people who might be struggling. He's just throwing taxpayers money at EVERYONE, the majority of whom haven't asked for it, and don't need it, whilst taking it away with the other hand. The scheme is unmanageable, and whilst a small minority of children will no doubt benefit, this is just not a sensible way to tackle the issue. Most of the money will be spent on food that is not needed, for people who didn't need it and haven't asked for it.

Why does Sadiq not just scrap the hated ULEZ scheme, give people back their £12.50 a day so that they can spend it on food for their kids themselves, and focus his support on people who actually need help?

If the Ashfield Independents think this is a good way forward and Sadiq is somebody we should be seeking to emulate, then let's all thank our lucky stars they aren't in charge of it!! I will NEVER take funding away from key services that our County's most vulnerable people rely on, or raise taxes and charges on residents, in order to fund lunches for people who are already well off! It's nuts!

The state is already too big, too expensive, and taxes too high as it is. The welfare state is a safety net, and help needs to be targeted at those who need it. Taxpayer's money should be used where it's most effective, in supporting people who are really struggling; not on buying food for families who are earning $\pounds100k+$ already.

That's why we rejected the Ashfield Independents' plans at Full Council.

Discussing HS2 on BBC Politics East Midlands

There's a lot of conversation in the media about HS2 East at the minute, and my view is this...

New hub stations around Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire are important centres for new jobs and investment, and plans we've been working in for a long time. It's vital that High Speed Trains ultimately reach those stations, and it's vital we have certainty on that ASAP so we can begin delivering on those plans.

In truth though, apart from the Birmingham to Nottingham/Derby new bit of line, which is really beneficial and important, north of there I can see multiple options as to how you can tick those boxes for us ensure that our area's priorities are delivered. It doesn't have to be one big new expensive track, and you could tick all those boxes whilst also saving money and helping more people to actually be able to access the service.

There are options where you could get trains to all the key places, improve times, improve capacity and still tick our local boxes, as well as save money. I want to lock in maximum opportunity as quickly as possible, and get some certainty. I'm much more bothered about the potential for growth, jobs and investment than I am about whether it's one big track, or several smaller ones etc.

There are several options that would work, some that can both work and save a lot of money, and I'm talking to Government about that. The key thing is we get a) investment and b) certainty as soon as possible.

Home Secretary is spot on with seeking changes to international rules on asylum

I've been listening to the Home Secretary's speech from Wednesday on Illegal Migration and the Asylum system, as I travelled in to the office this morning.

Can I say, she's absolutely spot on, and I'm pleased to hear her setting the scene for Britain to seek changes to international rules and obligations in this space. She's right to say that the legal framework around asylum, set up after the Second World War to try and support the safe passage of 2m people displaced by war, is now outdated, and we live in a different time. That number now, under those same rules, has grown to over 700m!

She's also right to say that Britain, and other nations, can't be expected to wait for global consensus, and she lays out a range of arguments as to why Britain has to act independently to tackle illegal migration.

Clear, measured arguments about the viability of a nation-state and a British culture under the pressure of 'multiculturalism and too much, too fast; important security arguments, and the obvious financial and practical implications of scrambling to find enough resource, enough infrastructure, and to prop up public services that can't cope.

It's half an hour long, but honestly, thoroughly recommend a listen of you want to understand Britain's approach to tackling this, the Home Secretary's view, and the action were taking as a country.

It was great to chat about their work and plans, a bit about the future, and how we can work more closely across the sector. I also met Paul, a young lad who's using the service, with his own story to tell.

Top stuff, honestly, and Marcellus' own journey is remarkable. Something to be incredibly proud of!

I've been to **Reach Learning Disability** at the St John's Centre where they're offering day support services to local people of all ages. It's great to hear they're growing, and that they've just built their own new supported accommodation too and expanded what they do. Big thanks for the invite!




At Rainworth and Blidworth Boxing Club!
