County Council Budget revealed

This week we revealed out budget proposals for Nottinghamshire County Council for the coming year. Whilst Councils all around us are under pressure, Nottinghamshire County Council is well placed to tackle these challenges and continue to deliver sustainable public services in the the future.

As Labour at Mansfield District and in at the City Council are making huge cuts following high profile examples of their wasteful spending, the Conservative-led County is investing in those services, and continuing to deliver a major programme of school building and other capital improvements.

Whilst those Labour Councils have failed to manage their budgets effectively, and the talk in the city is now of a potential 15% Council Tax increase, in the County we've got a long term plan to reform and modernise our services that has made us sustainable, and means that we've never taken the maximum Council Tax rise in the three years that I've been the Leader.

The headlines from our Budget for 2024/5 are:

- we're going to be spending £43m more on key services like social care and helping vulnerable children.
- we're adding an additional £4m (almost a 10% increase) in to our roads funding to help get things back up to scratch, ahead of the introduction of the new regional Transport Fund under the Mayor.
- we're continuing to focus on prevention and early help, delivering more services in the areas with the highest levels of need
- we're not cutting any front line services, and residents can be assured that they don't need to worry about those services disappearing.

What all of this shows is that, with good management and a long term plan, we can run a tight ship that offers ever-increasing value for money and can invest more in areas that residents want us to prioritise.

It also shows that if you want that locally, in Mansfield and in Nottinghamshire, you need a Conservative council!

Patching works across Mansfield

Here you can see an example of the road patching works that have been completed in Mansfield in recent weeks. As the weather improves, Highways teams will increasingly be able to shift away from emergency repairs and back to doing much more patching and resurfacing.

Last week the County Council announced a £4m increase in funding for these kinds of major repairs, and the full programme of work for the summer will be announced in a few weeks.

A lot of people have rightly pointed out that it's the main roads in Mansfield that need the major works. That is why main road resurfacing will be part of the capital programme for the summer, which will be announced in a few weeks.

Mansfield Diagnostic Centre

There will be a dedicated information session next week for local people to learn more about plans to bring the second phase of building Nottinghamshire's first Community Diagnostics Centre.

The event is being hosted by Sherwood Forest Hospitals in the main reception of Mansfield Community Hospital on Stockwell Gate between 10am and 4pm on Tuesday 20 February.

The event is open to all. People attending can expect to learn more about the plans to deliver even better access to tests and investigations they need in one visit, reducing the time it takes for patients to receive an 'all clear' or diagnosis sooner.

The CDC project has already begun, with a huge increase in tests and scans already being made available at the Community Hospital, but the Government's plan is to deliver significant new space to grow this further, and the new Diagnostic Centre building will be delivered starting this summer.

Pharmacy First making a difference

Clearing a couple of things up!

A couple of myths to bust this week, as residents are contacting me having got the wrong end of the stick.

MYTH 1: I absolutely haven't closed Mansfield Citizens Advice. I've seen the news, Conservative Councillors have been speaking with the CAB to try and help. The budget reductions that have happened have been as a result of Labour-run Mansfield District Council's budget cuts. Not me. The Labour Mayor of Mansfield and his Cabinet have taken this decision, not me.

Where I am responsible at Nottinghamshire County Council, we continue to support the CAB through our Local Communities Fund. I have also been to Government and secured more funding for Councils. Conservative Opposition Councillors on the District actually proposed an amendment to Labour's Budget that would have kept the CAB open, but Labour said no.

MYTH 2: Unfortunately I don't have the power to sack Councillors. Following Ashfield Independent Councillor Tom Hollis' further conviction and fines in court this week I have been asked why I continue to keep him as a Councillor. Unfortunately only the public can remove a Councillor, and the only way he can be forcibly removed is if he is imprisoned, goes bankrupt or resigns. I don't have the power to do that. I wish I did, but I don't.

I want to make clear that Councillor Hollis is not part of my administration, does not have any role in the running of the Council, and if I had the power I would have removed him long ago. Unfortunately I don't have that power, and the Ashfield Independent group continue to offer him additional responsibilities and allowances. I think that's wrong. I think he brings all Councillors in to disrepute. I've previously called on him to do the right thing and resign. Unfortunately I don't have any power to forcibly remove him. Hope that clears a few things up



Experience is absolutely key! Why am I standing to be the first mayor of the East Midlands?

If the election for the new regional Mayor for Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire was a job application, then I'm the only candidate who would tick the boxes in terms of having the right experience and record of delivery. I'm the only one who is tried and tested, and that has proven they can deliver on the key things that the Mayor will be responsible for. The Mayor will be responsible for £4bn and building this whole new organisation from scratch. Experience is key.

There's nobody else in the country who has the experience that I do of our new devolution deal, of how it works and what is needed. I'm the only person who has been part of it since day one, from both the local side and also working on the national legislation. I negotiated and signed the deal, I helped draft the law that creates it, I'm already working on building the organisation. That experience is unique and can't be matched.

I already work on all of our region's major growth projects and opportunities, such as our Freeport, Investment Zone, Development Company and STEP Fusion Energy. I've been one of the people who has successfully secured these investments and brought them here around £25bn in total, including STEP which is the single biggest investment in our region since the M1. For every other candidate these responsibilities will be totally new, but I've been doing it for years.

I've worked with Government to deliver major investment, I've successfully run one of the country's largest Councils that is among the the most financially stable in Britain, I'm the only candidate that has run a Transport Authority, and I'm one of the people who finally got this devolution deal over the line after the region had been trying for a decade. If this were a job application, no other candidate gets anywhere close to this level of experience. That's why other candidates can only give you generic statements about 'making things better', whilst I'm the only one who can tell you 'what' and 'how'.

If we want to ensure that the new Combined Authority gets off to the right start, that plans are made well, the structure works and that we can deliver the best outcomes, we need a Mayor with the experience to manage it properly. We can't afford to elect someone who is going to take a year just to 'get their feet under the table' and figure it out. If they get it wrong, then it could cause more problems than it solves.

Choosing the right person on May 2nd is absolutely key.
